Dear friends and family of OCUMC:

A parable for our times: On a dangerous seacoast where shipwrecks often occur, there was once a crude little lifesaving station. The building was no more than a hut, and there was only one boat; but the few devoted members kept a constant watch over the sea. With no thought for themselves, they went out day and night, tirelessly searching for the lost. Some of these who were saved, and various others in the surrounding area, wanted to be associated with the station and gave their time, money and effort to support the work. New boats where bought and new crews trained. The little lifesaving station grew. Some of these new members of the lifesaving station were unhappy that the building was so crude and poorly equipped. They felt that a more comfortable place should be provided as the first refuge of those who were saved from the sea. They replaced the emergency cots with beds and put better furniture in the enlarged building. Now the lifesaving station became a popular gathering place for its members, and they decorated it beautifully and furnished it exquisitely because they used it as a sort of club. Fewer members were now interested in going to sea on lifesaving missions, so they hired lifeboat crews to do this work. The lifesaving motif still prevailed in this club's decoration, and there was a memorial lifeboat in the room where the club initiations were held. About this time a large ship was wrecked off the coast, and the hired crews brought in boatloads of cold, wet, half-drowned people. They were dirty and sick, and some of them were foreigners. The beautiful new club was in chaos. Immediately, the property committee hired someone to rig up a shower house outside the club, where victims of shipwrecks could be cleaned up before coming inside.

At the next meeting, there was a split in the club membership. Most of the members wanted to stop the club's lifesaving activities because they felt they were unpleasant and a hindrance to the normal social life of the club. A small number of members insisted upon lifesaving as their primary purpose and pointed out that they were still called a lifesaving station. The small group's members were voted down and told that if they wanted to save lives, they could begin their own lifesaving station down the coast. They did. As the years went by, however, the new station experienced the same changes that had occurred in the old station. It evolved into a club, and yet another lifesaving station was founded. History continued to repeat itself, and if you visit that seacoast today, you will find a number of exclusive clubs along that shore. Shipwrecks are frequent in those waters, but most of the passengers don't make it.

Thank you OCUMC, for being a church that cares about the poor. The lost. The widow and the orphan. The outcast.

WE NOW HAVE A MATCHING GRANT OF \$25,000. Every dollar raised is doubled!



We are also helping with gifts that may be on the wish lists of some of the families. This is where our Christmas tree in the Narthex comes back into view. There will be ornaments with gift card suggestions, cash donation amounts, or a specific toy or gift from a wish list. You will be able to choose just how you want to participate. You may rather just put a donation in the collection plate, marked "Christmas Family Project" and that will be credited to your giving record. If you put your name on the cash amount you select from the tree, your giving will also be recorded. We appreciate any type of giving because having a sufficient amount of cash to work with makes our job easier. Some of you prefer to allow your children to pick ornaments with gift ideas and then shop with them. It can be a "teaching moment".

You will see the tree greet you again around the first of November. All items (cash, gift cards, ornament gifts etc.) need to be in **by Sunday December 1st** in order for us to get all the gift boxes filled and other items purchased to complete the project to be delivered to Love, Inc. in time for their party on Dec. 13th. So that gives us only a month to do our shopping and support the families in time for the holidays. We want to thank you in advance for your care and concern for others as we love others and value everyone.
